LAPD has identified "hot spot corridors" and chron LAPD has identified "hot spot corridors" and chronic offenders in eight Divisions. A laser-like targeted and focused approach is being used to address the problem. That is, rather than saturating an area with a large number of extra patrol officers or using a task force, the focus is placed on being in the right place at the right time. Officers on foot, bike, and in cars are given specific locations to work in and to prevent crime. Similarly, special units are given a certain number of chronic offender bulletins and asked to watch them, surveil them, and if necessary, make arrests for outstanding warrants, probation/parole violations, or for specific crimes.
